

Guns In Your RV

Traveler's Guide to the Gun Laws of the Fifty States.

- The exact legal requirements for using deadly force in self-defense can vary by jurisdiction, generally they tend to revolve around the following five fundamental principles as predicates for the justifiable use of deadly force:
- 1. Imminent Threat: Deadly force can typically only be used when facing immediate, present danger. The threat must be happening now or soon—it cannot be used against past or anticipated future threats.
- 2. Reasonable Fear: The individual must genuinely believe that their life, or the life of someone else, is in immediate danger. The concept of a "reasonable person" is often used to determine this—in other words, would an average person in the same situation also feel threatened?
- **3. Proportional Force**: The force used in self-defense should be proportional to the threat faced. Excessive force, where the response is much more severe than the threat, can lead to criminal charges. If the danger is non-lethal, then using deadly force may not be justifiable.
- **4. No Duty to Retreat**: In some jurisdictions, the individual must try to retreat from the threat if it is safe before deadly force can be legally used. However, under "Stand Your Ground" laws and the "Castle Doctrine" in some states, there is no duty to retreat in one's home or public places, respectively.
- **5. Non-Aggressor**: The individual claiming self-defense cannot be the one who initiated the conflict. Starting or provoking a fight often disqualifies the ability to claim self-defense.

Know your Escape Plan from your RV

- If you have a fire in your RV, does everyone in your family know the escape plan?
- Have you planned one yet?
- If not, do it.
- And practice it.









Carbon Monoxide & Smoke Detectors

- Do you have adequate fire extinguishing equipment in your RV?
- Remember carbon monoxide (or 'CO') is the "Silent Killer." You can't smell or detect it in the air, yet it can be fatal. Get a CO detector.
- Don't heat your RV with your stove.
- Don't use a barbecue or charcoal grill in your RV or tent.











5th Wheels, Travel Trailers & Receivers

- Utilize Trailer Hitch and Fifth Wheel Locks.
- Lock Your Tow Bar.
- Lock Your Bike Rack.
- Lock You Bike Either On The Rack or At Your Site.

Don't Leave Food Outside

- Leaving food (even dog food) outside can attract unwanted animals to your campsite.
- So to avoid having skunks, bears, raccoons and other critters sniffing around your campsite, make sure to bring all your food inside at night.









First Aid Kit



- When you're camping sometimes "things" happen. We cut ourselves. We burn ourselves. We scrape our knees. And on and on...
- Do you have a first aid kit in your RV to deal with these situations?
- Having a first aid kit, and knowing how to use it are different. If you're in the bush and away from immediate medical attention you should take some first aid classes. You never know when you may need that knowledge.
- Along with a first aid kit, don't forget to include your prescription medications. And you may want to consider including some antihistamines (allergy medicines) in case anyone in your party has a mild allergic reaction. Talk to your doctor or pharmacist for recommendations.









Tire Pressure Monitoring System

- Tire blowouts commonly happen when RVing.
- Tire Monitoring System Is A Must.
- Can minimize any damage to your RV and help avoid a more serious situation









Surge Protector

- Protect the large and expensive appliances.
- Large electrical surge can do a tremendous amount of damage to your RV's electrical system and the electronics inside your.
